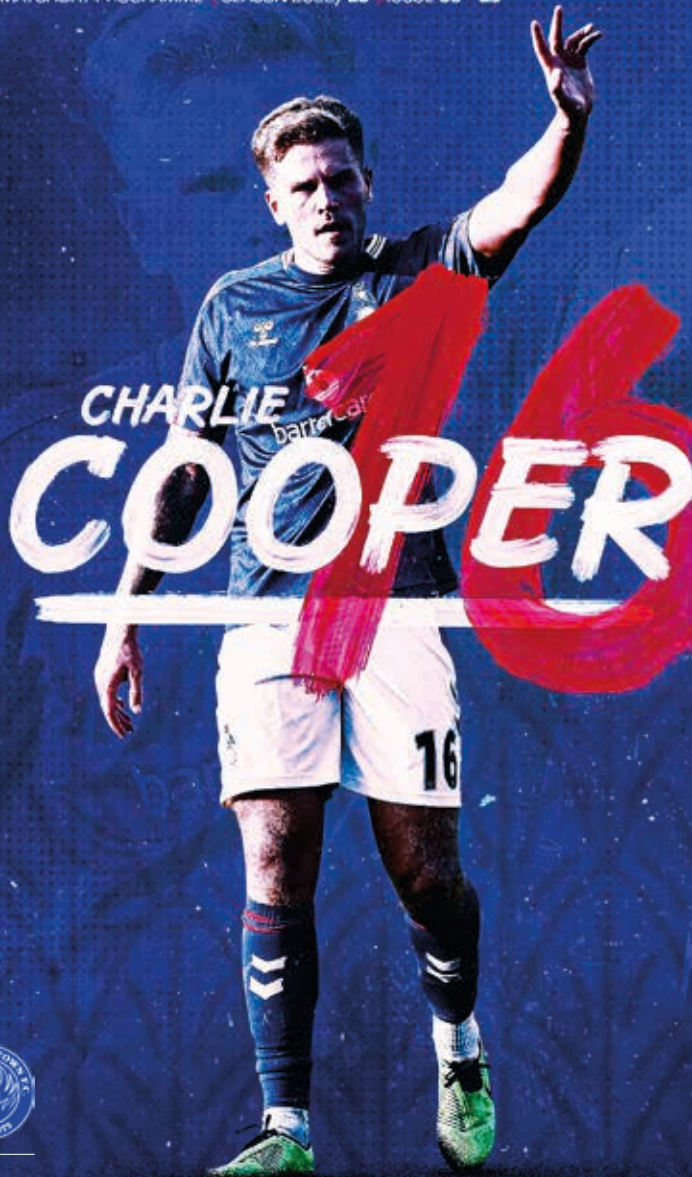

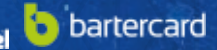

# FROM THE BOARDROOM

## I'D LIKE TO START BY WELCOMING YOU ALL TO BOUNDARY PARK ON A WARM FRIDAY EVENING.

**That sounds like a unique sentence, as Friday night games don't happen very often, but they can't be as rare as a warm Boundary Park evening!**

These are my first notes from the Boardroom and I'd like to take this opportunity introduce myself.

The emotions that afternoon touched us all and to everyone who played a part in creating those incredible scenes I'd like to say a huge thank you.

My role at Boardroom level during recent developments has been to negotiate with Abdallah Lemsagam and Simon Blitz.

I'd like to use these pages to give some insight into that process while being respectful of the required confidentiality. We have

often used the analogy that this deal has been like a very long combination lock. If any of the numbers didn't line up then it is fair to say that the end result would never have happened!

### 1ST NUMBER: COVID

If it wasn't for the Covid-19 pandemic we wouldn't have had the opportunity. It is uncomfortable to say this because of the enormous impact Covid has had on the lives of so many people. Our Bunkabin business provided the cash for us to do this deal because of the demands that have arisen because of the pandemic.

### 2ND NUMBER: THE ATHLETICOS

It has been well documented what an impact the atmosphere created by the Athleticos had on us as a family during the game we attended against Leyton Orient last season and our subsequent decision to take matters further.

### 3RD NUMBER: MEETING DARREN ROYLE

As a family, we quickly became very energised when Darren presented his vision to form a

local consortium to recouple the club and its home. The volume of work that Darren has been doing for a number of years is incredible. His intelligence, perseverance and passion pours out of him.

It became clear from very early on that our two families are so similar in our principles and passions. Core values of hard work and wanting to do the best for Oldham and its people, whilst having a huge amount fun along the way is at the centre of everything we are looking to achieve.

### 4TH NUMBER: RELEGATION

If we hadn't been relegated we wouldn't have been able to afford Latics. A silver-lining, indeed!

### 5TH NUMBER: MEETING SIMON BLITZ

What a guy! The coincidence that Simon was in the country the same week we first met Darren was extremely fortunate and timely.

Simon showed us around the Joe Royle Stand, GLO Gym, the OEC, surrounding land and Little Wembley. It was when we enjoyed

the views from the top floor of the stand that we could genuinely feel the opportunity and started to get very excited.

Simon has been incredible and continues to do everything he can to make a very complicated agreement as simple as possible. He has always kept to his word and we thank him for this.

Any issues that could have derailed the agreement have been avoided thanks to Simon. We have relentlessly tried to simplify the agreement but unfortunately an agreement of this size is complicated and takes time.

### 6TH NUMBER: SUCCESSFUL NEGOTIATION WITH ABDALLAH

I really enjoyed the negotiations with Abdallah. Sometimes they were challenging but they were always respectful, very polite and fair.

Abdallah was always available, sometimes negotiating when it was 2am over in Dubai. We worked very hard to find a way that worked for both parties. If Abdallah wasn't prepared to sell or work hard to complete the deal the timeframe of within four weeks then things wouldn't have been finalised before the start of the season. We would like to thank Abdallah.

### 7TH NUMBER: SIMON BLITZ AND ABDALLAH COMPROMISE

We must pay a huge credit for both Simon and Abdallah for contacting each other and compromising on the issues they

had. If this hadn't happened then I don't believe we would have been able to achieve our aim to bring the club and ground under the same ownership. Again, I'd like to pay a huge thank you to them both for reaching a compromise.

### 8TH NUMBER: OEC

In some ways it feels wrong to single people out but the work and personal sacrifice of both Simon Brooke and Paul Whitehead needs to be recognised. The facilities that include the OEC and GLO Gym showed us what potential the club has. Reaching their own achievements in the face of the enormous issues they have encountered is incredible. You could write a book, so well done and thank you.

### 9TH NUMBER: BPAS PODCASTS

These were extremely valuable to understand the historic issues surrounding the club, as well as providing belief that the supporters groups are full of constructive ideas and genuinely want to help the club.

### 10TH NUMBER: OAFK STAFF

We are continuing to hear examples of staff going way beyond what should be expected. Thank you for being so supportive through the four weeks of due diligence.

There are many, many more numbers in the combination but I'm running out of space! I'll leave them for another time.

Welcome Home, Groundsman Dean!

Darren Royle is working very hard identifying areas where we need to recruit to rebuild as a business. We are over the moon to announce we have recruited a new Head Groundsman. I met Dean Pickering Jnr on the day that the takeover was announced, I was very impressed with him and he obviously has a huge passion for Oldham and his career.

### INCLUSIVE ACTIONS

As a board, we are passionate about making the club inclusive and welcoming for everyone. To show our commitment to this policy we have installed a multi-faith prayer room, providing a space where people of differing religious beliefs are able to spend time in contemplation or prayer.

It is our aim to make Boundary Park a welcoming place for all. If away supporters choose one away day a year, let's make it that they choose here! # ZAINE IN THE ZONE

**AFTER SUCCESSIVE PROMOTIONS, THE LEFT-BACK HAS SET HIS SIGHTS ON FURTHER SUCCESS FOLLOWING HIS ARRIVAL AT BOUNDARY PARK...**

**A**s one of a number of players recruited this summer with previous experience of the National League, Zaine Francis-Angol knows all about what it takes to do well at this level.

Having been part of the Hartlepool side that earned promotion through the play-offs in 2020, the left-sided defender went one better last season as he finished the campaign by lifting the title at Stockport.

The quest for automatic promotion last year was a titanic struggle, the team from Edgeley Park pipping big-spending Wrexham on the final day of the season

after running neck-and-neck throughout the year.

If anything, that quest for the title highlights the level of competition within the National League but also shows that the biggest pool of resources is not always a guarantee of success.

Francis-Angol joined Latics in the summer with the sole aim of achieving a third promotion from this level. Results so far this campaign have been mixed, but as one of 11 new additions, the 29-year-old knows that success does not always come quickly.

Having featured throughout pre-season at left-back, Francis-Angol has completed all four of the opening league fixtures as a wing-back as

manager John Sheridan has plumped for a shape build on a base of three central defenders.

With his attacking instincts and a solid defensive understanding, it is a role that has suited the former Motherwell and Accrington player, who is hungry for further success.

"I've really enjoyed my first six weeks at the club," says Francis-Angol, who has also been capped 18 times by Antigua & Barbuda. "I joined at the start of pre-season, which is always a tough period for any player, but I feel like I've settled in well and I'm looking forward to the season ahead.

"We've got a really good group of players, there are quite a lot





of new lads who have come in this summer, but everyone has settled in well and we feel that we are starting to gel. Results haven't all gone the way we've wanted so far but it usually takes time when a new squad is put together and I'm sure we'll be able to kick on as a group over the next few weeks.

"There are quite a few familiar faces in the squad who I've either played with before or have come up against in the past. We've got a lot of players who know the division well and that experience is going to be vital for us this season.

"From a personal point of view, my focus has been about coming in, making my mark on the squad and hopefully being able to achieve good things as the season gets up and running properly.

"It's still early days and we're not expecting to be the finished article at this stage. We've obviously been disappointed with some of our results but there's a lot of quality in this squad and everything is now set up to make sure we do well.

"This season is a challenge I'm really looking forward to. No league is easy, and that's definitely the case in this division, but as a player you want to be competing for something come the business end of the season.

"That's the reason I'm here and it's also why most of the new lads have been signed this summer."

Joining for the latter part of both campaigns, Francis-Angol earned promotion with Hartlepool and Stockport under the management of Dave Challinor.

It was Sheridan who recruited him this summer and, having also played in the National League during two seasons with AFC Fylde and a further campaign at Boreham Wood, he knows the landscape well.

Francis-Angol is fully aware of the level of competition within the National League but believes Latics have the necessary components to be a genuine force this year.

"Shez is a very good manager who has got lots of experience and is someone I've really enjoyed working with," he adds. "He knows what he wants and as players we've got to perform at our best to meet the standard he expects.

"He spoke to me before I signed about what he wants for the club this season, the sort of players he has tried to bring in and the way he wants us to play as a team. I also know a few players who have played for him previously and if anyone is going to get the club going in

the right direction again then I'm sure it's him.

"I have high standards for myself but Shez has said that in me he wants someone who can attack, provide support down the wing, contribute to our overall play and also be solid in the defensive side of the game.

"The National League is definitely a tough division to get out of. You've only got to look at the title race last season, how well a team like Wrexham did and it wasn't enough for them to go up.

"Especially at this level, however, it's not always about the funding that a club has got behind it. If you can get a squad of players with the right balance, good competition and the character to do well, those qualities are as important as anything in making sure a team is up there competing at the top.

"When you look at our games so far, there have been some encouraging signs with how well we defended at Torquay and the chances created against Dorking.

"We've shown we are a team who can move the ball well and can also keep our shape as a unit. There are still partnerships to be built and I'm confident we will continue to see a steady development over

the next few games. The teams who do well at this level are no doubt the consistent ones and that's what it's all about for us as we look forward."

Francis-Angol was part of a solid defensive unit which earned a battling point at Torquay on the opening day before playing his part in the win over Dorking at a packed Boundary Park.

Although the results against Wealdstone and Southend were disappointing, the experienced defender believes Latics are still on course for a successful campaign.

The nucleus of Sheridan's side is continuing to gel and Francis-Angol sees

similarities between Oldham and the other two clubs he has recently represented, not least the passion in the stands.

"If you ask anyone about Hartlepool and Stockport, one of the biggest things they have in common is the size of the fanbase," he says. "Arriving here and seeing the support of the Oldham fans takes that to another level and as a player that's something you thrive off massively.

"The support we've received at the first two home games in particular has been unreal. You could see at the match against Dorking how much passion the fans have got for this club and we now want

to do that justice out on the pitch.

"Having that many supporters pushing you forward and cheering you on gives you a massive boost when you're out on the pitch. The club is far too big to be at this level and we know it's our responsibility now to get Oldham back to where it belongs.

"The fans are going to be key for us this season, especially when you look at the atmosphere they can create at home games. That support, together with a good manager and strong group of players, will make sure we are in with a real chance of doing well this season."

WITH BEN TOLLITT

**BEN TOLLITT ON GROWING UP ON THE DOORSTEP OF ANFIELD, DAVID BECKHAM MOHAWKS AND MORE...**

### FIRST TEAM SUPPORTED

I'm a huge Liverpool fan. I grew up literally five minutes away from the ground, my family all had season tickets and it's something that's been passed down through each generation.

### FIRST FOOTBALL MEMORY

My dad played in the local leagues in Liverpool and I used to really enjoy watching him play as a kid. I'd go down with some of his mates and would stand with them on the touchline to watch.

### FIRST MAJOR TOURNAMENT YOU WATCHED

The 2002 World Cup in Japan and South Korea. I was at school and because of the kick-off times we were allowed to watch the quarter-final against Brazil in the big hall. We all missed our lessons and I was sat there with my red David Beckham mohawk!

### FIRST GAME ATTENDED

It was a Liverpool reserve game around 2000. My dad took me to see if I'd like it and I absolutely loved it. I've been to plenty more since!

### FIRST FOOTBALL HERO

Even though I'm a Liverpool fan, my hero is Cristiano Ronaldo. Growing up, I played in the same position as him, he gets people on the edge of their seats and I've tried to replicate that the best I can.

### FIRST FOOTBALL KIT

I was lucky enough to have every Liverpool kit growing up and the first one I remember

was from the 2000/01 treble-winning season with Robbie Fowler on the back.

### FIRST PAIR OF BOOTS

My dad hates different coloured boots so he bought me a classic pair of black Umbros. He can't stand the boots I wear now!

### FIRST TEAM PLAYED FOR

Mossley Hill in Liverpool was my first team. Some of the community coaches from Liverpool came into my school and I didn't have a team so was invited down.

### FIRST PROFESSIONAL CONTRACT

I signed for Portsmouth in 2015 which was a big move for me. I was working for my dad while playing part-time for Widnes when I got the call out of the blue.

### FIRST SENIOR GAME

After joining Pompey, I made my debut against Derby in what was then the Capital One Cup. We won 2-1 and I've still got my shirt framed at home.

### FIRST SENIOR MANAGER

Paul Cook was my manager at Portsmouth. He's a guy who knows his stuff, he was really good to play for and I'm looking forward to seeing him again when we play Chesterfield in a few weeks.

### FIRST MEMORABLE MOMENT

Making my debut and then scoring my first goal for a big club like Portsmouth were huge moments.

### FIRST GOAL

It came in my third game for Pompey in November 2015 against York. As soon as the ball hit the net I didn't have a clue what to do! Fratton Park was bouncing and it's something you dream of as a youngster.





# THE LOWDOWN

JAMES READE ON THE POWER OF FIVES

THE PROFESSOR OF ECONOMICS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF READING AND LATIC'S FAN EXAMINES THE IMPORTANCE OF MATCHDAY 5 OVER THE YEARS...

**Football is a game of numbers. How many we scored, and how many they got.**

Current Latics Director, and legendary club manager, Joe Royle, operated on a basis that Oldham would score more goals than the opposition.

He famously said [did he?] that if they scored, three, we'd score four.

On 14 March 1992, Latics did just that. Andy Ritchie scored a quick-fire hat-trick against Notts County in a Barclays League Division One match. Notts County pegged us back from 1-0 down and 3-1 down, but Ian Marshall hit a long-range winner late in the game.

It's a fond memory of our glory days. It's also the last match Latics played before Aldershot FC, on 20 March 1992, played their final ever match - a 2-0 home win over Cardiff City in Division Four.

On 18 March Aldershot were wound up in the High Court, and the following Wednesday were liquidated and their league records expunged.

On 22 August 1992, while Latics were going one better

than winning 4-3 in beating Nottingham Forest 5-3, Aldershot Town were being reborn, playing their first match in the Isthmian League Division Three against Clapton.

While tonight is our first match against the reborn Aldershot Town, their re-emergence as a Football League force was complete back in 2008 when they won the National League (or Conference National as it was called then) to enter League Two.

In 2009/10 they finished sixth in League Two, and hence in pyramid terms were only 13 places beneath Latics who finished 17th in League One that season.

That five-goal win against Forest back in 1992, though, was our only win in our first four matches that season, and today we reach game five in the season, as we did then, with just a solitary win. How much does that matter? What is the power of five? Can it yield insights into the rest of the season?

Well, it matters. Statistically speaking, league position after five matches is correlated with league position after 46. That is,

where a team is having played four matches does give some indication of where they will be at the end of the season.

And it certainly seems to matter. In seasons where we've won or drawn our fifth match, we've finished, on average, in 12th. When we've lost our fifth match though, we've finished, on average, 14th. It's the difference between a top and bottom half finish.

But the correlation coefficient is only about 0.5 between position after four games and position after 46. In other words, there's much to play for. The fifth match does feel significant though, and we've had plenty of good ones over the years.

In that 1992/93 inaugural Premier League season, we went to Maine Road to face Manchester City. Mike Milligan's cheeky backflip goal helped us on our way to a solid 3-3 draw, but as we all know, a miserable February left us in serious danger of relegation before our Great Escape that season.

Scoring three was something Latics did with seeming impunity on Matchday 5 in the

1980s and 1990s: 3-1 vs Hull in 1985, 3-0 vs Bradford (away) in 1986, 3-2 vs Huddersfield in 1987, 3-2 vs Plymouth in 1989 and 3-0 vs Oxford in 1990.

In 1994/95, our second outside the Premier League after relegation, we fell to a disappointing 1-0 defeat away at Southend United in a season where we finished 13th in the Championship.

One-goal defeats to Southend in and around Matchday 5 are a common theme, as we managed the same, albeit at home, in 2007, losing 0-1 at Boundary Park to the Shrimpers. That season,

though, we finished eighth in League One. And of course, we lost 1-0 at Roots Hall last weekend.

So the fifth game isn't necessarily the bellwether. Indeed, in the last ten years, while we've suffered two relegations, we've only lost three times in game five: 0-1 at home to Tranmere in 2013, 3-4 at home against Charlton Athletic in 2017, and 2-3 to Morecambe in 2020 at an Covid-necessitated empty Boundary Park.

In that time we've also won three times - 2-1 at Sutton last season (23rd finish), with

Junior Luamba netting a late, late winner, 2-1 at Cambridge in 2019 (19th finish), Laurent Banide's only league win as head coach, 2-0 at Morecambe in 2018 (14th), and 2-0 at Doncaster in 2014 (15th).

Overall, our fifth game record is a winning one - we've won 38, drawn 32 and lost 34 of these early crunch ties.

In that time, we've netted on average 1.7 goals per game at home, conceding 1.2. After our 1-2 reverse against Wealdstone, on this statistical theme, here's hoping for some reversion to the mean this evening as we entertain Aldershot.



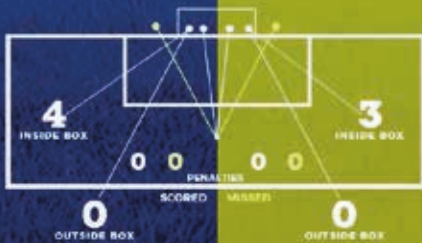

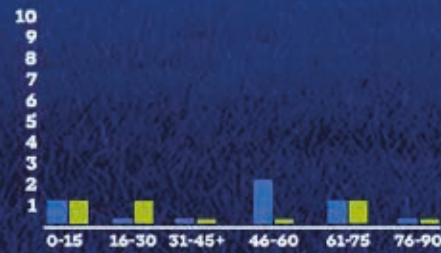

**After a slow start to the campaign, Mark Molesley's Aldershot side visit Boundary Park this evening looking to double their points tally for the season.**

The Shots started this campaign with a near-completely different squad to the one that finished 20th in the National League last season, only one place above the relegation zone.

Over ten players were released, and four others rejected new contracts, including former Latic Mo Sylla, who joined Hartlepool.

A number of talented players have been brought in though, Ollie Harfield and Josh McQuoid joined from Molesley's former club Weymouth, and Inih Effiong joined from Woking, for whom he netted 13 times last season.

Aldershot are now in their

tenth season in the National League after relegation from the EFL in 2013, and despite twice qualifying for the play-offs in the intervening years, they have largely featured in the lower reaches of the division.

The Shots' opening four games this term have seen them lose twice at home, their solitary win so far coming at Boreham Wood.

They were beaten 4-1 on the opening day by Solihull Moors, Inih Effiong equalised following a Joe Sbarra opener, but three more goals from the away side, including a Ben Coker free-kick, sealed the win for Moors.

They lost 1-0 at Chesterfield thanks to a Liam Mandeville goal before beating a strong Boreham Wood side 2-1.

A 1-0 defeat to Bromley last weekend means they now sit 22nd in the National League.

**MARK MOLESLEY**

**Starting his coaching career in the youth set-up at Bournemouth, Mark Molesley progressed to become the assistant manager of the U21s at Dean Court, combining his role as player-coach of Weymouth.**

He became caretaker manager at the Dorset side in 2017, and was appointed permanent manager not long after.

He oversaw the club's rise to the National League, which earned him a move to in 2020 Southend United, who had then just been relegated from League One.

Molesley struggled to get results at Roots Hall and, with the club in freefall, was sacked in April the following year, with the Essex outfit 23rd in League Two, five points from safety, with six games to play.

He joined Aldershot in

October 2021 following the sacking of Danny Searle, with the side third from bottom in the National League, having lost five of their opening seven fixtures.

Molesley took the club out of the relegation zone following a fine run of form around Christmas, his side picking up 14 points from a possible 18, which included a 2-1 win over high-flying Grimsby Town, and victory in a six-pointer against King's Lynn Town at the Recreation Ground.

Despite some poor form towards the end of the season, Molesley ensured the Shots stayed up at the expense of King's Lynn.

He was behind a huge turnover in the playing squad during the summer, but has struggled to pick up results this season, although have faced some of the better sides in the division during their opening games.

#9 INIH EFFIONG

Age: 31  
Position: Striker

**Signed from Woking in the summer, Inih Effiong will be the man Aldershot look to for goals this season.**

The 31-year-old has played for 18 clubs during his career, mostly in the National League, National League South, and Southern League.

His first successful season came in 2010/11 with St Albans City, his 13 goals in 37 earning him move to Boreham Wood where he scored seven in 33.

16 goals for Dover helped secure a move to Stevenage in 2020, but he only made nine appearances before going out on loan.

He returned to the National League with Woking last summer, scoring 13 goals, before linking up with Mark Molesley at Aldershot in June.

### #3 OLLIE HARFIELD

The 24-year-old left-back joined the Shots following Weymouth's relegation from the top level of non-league football.

Harfield made his National League debut for Boreham Wood in 2017/18, but only played one minute in one game before joining Dagenham & Redbridge.

He struggled to nail down a place, and often played in different positions every week as the Daggers finished 18th.

He dropped down the National League South with Weymouth, helping them get promoted in his first season, and he stayed for two more seasons before they were relegated and joined Aldershot this summer.

He's a player with an eye for a pass, and is a reliable asset down the left flank.

### #10 JOSH MCQUOID

An experienced forward, McQuoid can play anywhere up front, and returned to Aldershot following four years with Weymouth.

The 32-year-old started his career with Bournemouth, where he was part of the side that earned promotion to League One, scoring nine in 17 in the third tier.

He struggled to score goals in the Football League in the following seasons and eventually dropped down to the Southern League Premier Division South with Weymouth.

He achieved back-to-back promotions with the Terras, seeing them reach the National League in 2020, scoring seven goals in each of his two National League seasons with the club before they were relegated last season.

He assisted Ryan Glover as he scored the Shots' 2nd in their 2-1 win over Boreham Wood last week, and will be looking to chip in with goals and assists like he did in his two National League seasons with Weymouth.

### #2 ARCHIE DAVIES

A young right-back and product of the Brighton Youth Academy, Davies joined Aldershot this summer following two seasons with Crawley Town.

He was a regular for Brighton's youth sides, and played in a number of their EFL Cup and EFL Trophy games before being released.

Crawley Town snapped him up on a two-year-deal, he rotated between the bench and starting XI at the start of his debut season but soon solidified his place in the Reds' side.

He was released by Crawley at the end of last season and made the short trip to sign for Aldershot.

He's played all the minutes of all matches this season, as he looks put a season of games together in men's football.

## THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW

**1.** The current Aldershot Town was founded in 1992. The Hampshire town had been left without a football club in March of the same year when Aldershot FC became the first Football League club since Accrington Stanley to fold mid-season. A staple member of the Football League since 1932 and competing in the third and fourth tiers of English football, financial troubles and debts saw them go bust.

**2.** The Shots enjoyed a rapid start to their life as a club. It took the club just 11 seasons to get promoted four times to what is now the National League. Not content with that, they continued to strive for improvement, and they had a few close runs at promotion. Their ambition was shown by the decision to convert to full-time status in July 2004 and eventually won promotion to the Football League in 2007/08, amassing a remarkable 101 points.

**3.** Some of the financial issues that saw the demise of the previous club threatened to rear their head again at Aldershot Town in 2013. The club had just been relegated from the League and five days later they entered administration with reported debts of over £1 million. August 2013 saw the takeover completed by current owner Shahid Azeem, and they have managed to achieve financial stability in the decade that has followed.

**4.** The Shots were fortunate to avoid relegation to the National League South in the 2018/19 season. They finished 21st in the table, occupying one of the automatic relegation spots. Fortunately for them, however, North East side Gateshead had ran into problems that saw them administratively relegated despite a solid ninth-placed finish. They are currently in their tenth season in the National League after finishing 23rd last campaign.

**5.** The Recreation Ground is the name of Aldershot's current home. It has been playing host to football in the town since 1927, previously to the now defunct Aldershot FC and from 1992 onwards Aldershot Town. The stadium's modern-day capacity is 7,100 but they boast a record attendance of 19,138 when Aldershot welcomed Carlisle United to the Rec for an FA Cup Fourth Round replay in 1970.

# THE DAYS OF OUR LIVES

ANDY LIDDELL // BY STUART VOSE

A FIRM FAN FAVOURITE DURING HIS FOUR SEASONS AT LATICS, THE WINGER RECALLS HIS ROLE IN A FANTASTIC SQUAD THAT WENT SO CLOSE TO PROMOTION...

**H**e was a key figure in the 2006/07 League One play-off campaign, but Andy Liddell's career at Latics almost ended not long after it began.

The winger arrived at Boundary Park in summer 2005 following a spell at Sheffield United, netting 11 times in his first season under Ronnie Moore.

But when the former Rotherham boss departed at the end of the season, he was replaced by John Sheridan, who moved quickly to head off interest from one of Latics' local rivals.

A well-timed phone call ensured Liddell went nowhere and he went on to play a key role as Athletic made the 2006-

07 play-offs.

Retaining the experienced ex-Wigan man was one of Sheridan's best moves, and having been "absolutely fine" with staying, Liddell again netted on 11 occasions and laid a boatload of assists for the front two of Chris Porter and Paul Warne.

Promotion wasn't to be in the end but Liddell has great memories of a squad he says had the perfect mix of youth and experience, brains and brawn.

"I was surprised when Ronnie went; he was a good guy to work for, but for whatever reason it happened," Liddell recalls.

"Shez called me in the summer

and at the time Burnley were interested in signing me. I knew a couple of players there, but he rang and said he'd got the job and that I wasn't going anywhere.

"He needed his experienced players and there were a few of us there, great characters.

"We had a good start to that season and just kept it going; I don't think anyone expected it.

"Oldham are a great club. I really, really liked playing there and playing for John. He is a really great guy. Tommy [Wright], Lee Duxbury, [physio] Lee Nobes who's now at Liverpool; they were all brilliant.

"We had some great characters during my time there, people

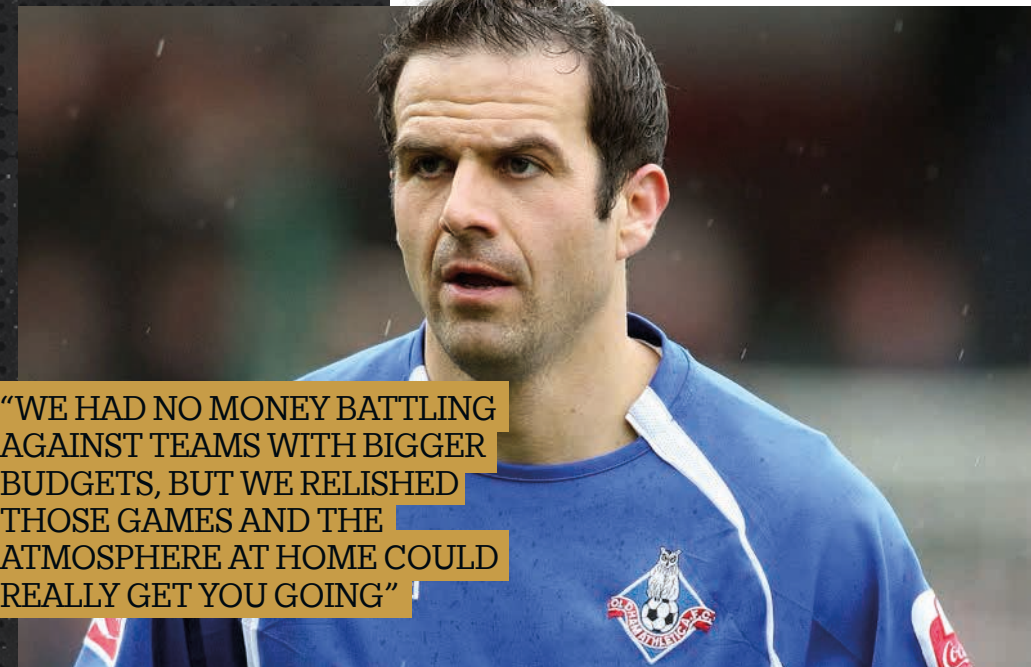
like Mark Allott, Danny Whittaker, Paul Warne, Sean Gregan, and some great young players - Chris Taylor, Neal Eardley, [Lewis] Alessandra, Deane Smalley.

"We were a skilled team but tough as well, both physically and verbally. We weren't shrinking violets and the likes of Gregan could dish out the odd tackle."

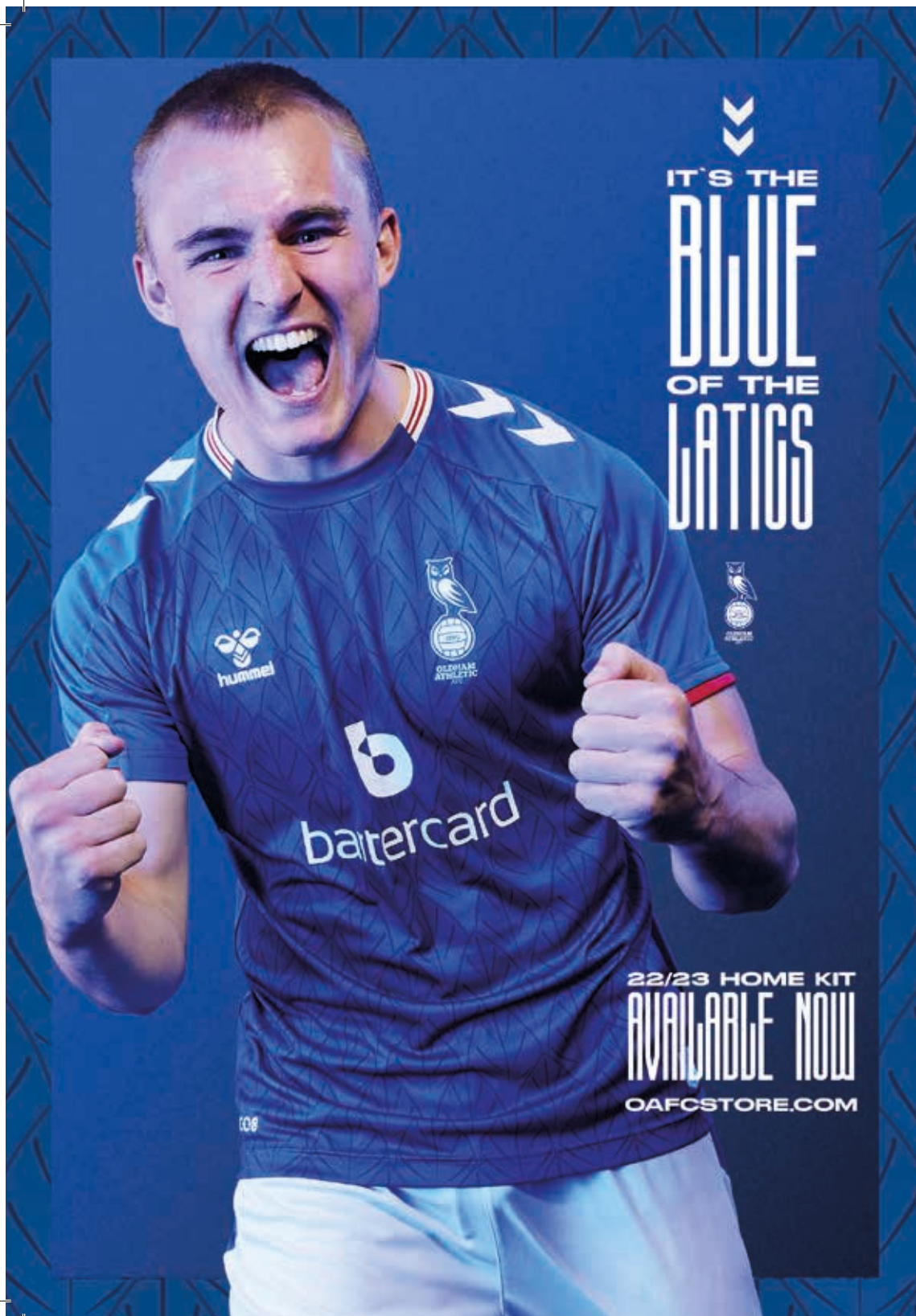
Liddell, who now lives in Portugal, remembers how Latics battled against the odds, with the 2006/07 League One field featuring six teams who went on to feature in the Premier League.

Those sides include Brentford, who finished bottom of the division that season.

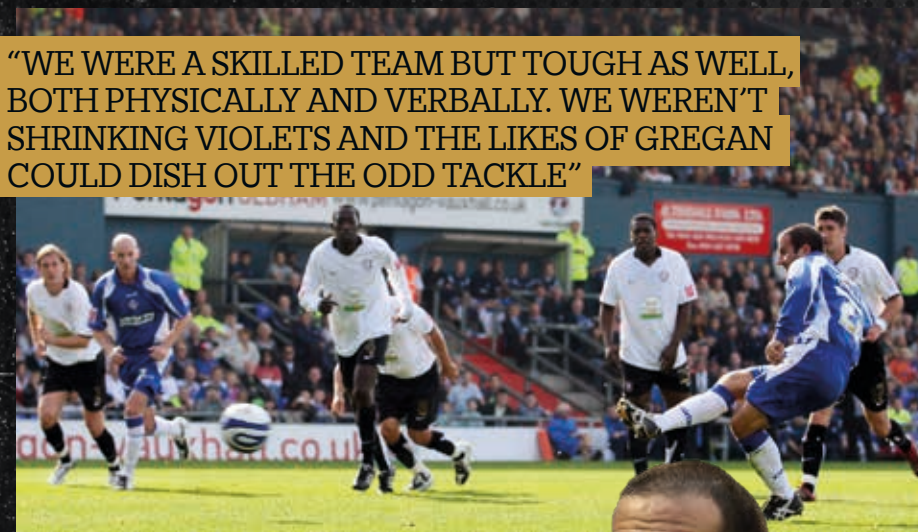
Latics' spirit was encapsulated by a 5-0 hammering of Nottingham Forest on New Year's Day 2007, with Liddell netting a brace of penalties that day alongside goals from Porter, Warne

and Craig Rocastle.

And the current squad will need to channel that spirit, with Liddell saying Sheridan's strong focus on standards will be key during the current National League campaign.

“It was a small squad; we had no money battling against teams with bigger budgets, but we relished those games and the atmosphere at home could really get you going,” he adds.

“The Forest game - we could have scored 25, never mind five. Going to Elland Road and winning. It was a real shame Blackpool did us in the play-offs - the goal I scored in the play-off second leg wasn't offside and it would have been interesting to see what would have happened if it would've stood.”

14 years have passed since Liddell last wore a Latics shirt, but with Sheridan now back at the helm, he is confident that the club will soon find itself on



an upward curve.

In total, Liddell represented Oldham 144 times over a four-year period, netting 29 goals, and he is backing his former boss to bring the good times back again.

“I'm sure the club can bounce back with the new owners and with Shez in charge; he knows the game,” Liddell says.

“He was always a straight guy with us and told you what he wanted. If you didn't do it you'd get nailed.

“As experienced lads we didn't need telling most of the time, but he was demanding.

“It's not tiddlywinks, it's professional football and it matters to people.

“John is an honest person; you want your managers to be honest which sounds simple but they are not all like that.

“I most recently worked with Mick McCarthy, and managers like him and Shez are a joy to work with.”





## A MOMENT IN TIME

Peter Berry recalls the first appearance in a Latics shirt for a true club legend...

**THE BIGGEST CROWD FOR OVER SIX YEARS, 17,116, WAS AT BOUNDARY PARK FOR THE FOURTH DIVISION CLASH AGAINST EXETER ON 15 OCTOBER 1960.**

The reason? The debut of Bobby Johnstone, one of the most influential players the club has ever had.

A Scottish international, also selected for a Great Britain team, he had been a part of Hibernian's double Scottish league titles and had scored for Manchester City in both two successive FA Cup finals.

With Latics in 91st place in the Football League it was a startling move but the presence of other ex-City players and his liking for "Lancashire folk" helped secure his signature, and coincided with the club's success over the next few years.

The programme was the simple, small, publication of that season, the cover featuring the Official Entrance and the date of the game but no opponents, although they were welcomed at the bottom of the Editorial page.

The bulk of that, however, was given over what was described as "the finest news for many a long day" and Bobby was given "our very best wishes on his debut." After only one win in the first 12 matches, three recent victories had given hope and the run continued

with Latics easily beating the Devon side 5-2, Johnstone getting one of the goals along with Bazley, Rackley and Liddell (2).

There wasn't a lot of reading in the 6d (2.5p) programme, although brief pen pictures of the away team showed that Glen Wilson, signed from Brighton in close season, was player-manager, and ex-Latic Jimmy Thompson was in the squad. His transfer to Exeter had caused controversy, Oldham's manager at the time saying it was a "sell to survive" necessity.

In a period when clubs often fielded part-timers, Exeter's forward Graham Rees was also training to be an accountant but still finished top scorer that season.

Spectators were entertained before the game (a 2.45pm kick-off, as there were no floodlights at Boundary Park yet) and at half-time by the Rose Fletcher Pipe Band and they could check the scores from a range of games on the scoreboard. Oldham Rugby were at Widnes, Bury at home to Reading, and Manchester City to Leicester.

The magic of Johnstone, allied to the shrewd management of Jack Rowley and players like Bert Lister, Jimmy Frizzell, and Ken Branagan, witnessed a revival in league fortunes, and a healthy 12th place was achieved by the end of the season.

# GOLDEN GOALS

Helping to earn a win that went a long way to securing Premier League survival, James Glonek recounts one of our finest top-flight strikes...



IAN OLNEY, LATICS 6 2 WIMBLEDON, 3 APRIL 1993

**WITH THE BUSINESS END OF THE 1992/93 SEASON APPROACHING, LATICS FOUND THEMSELVES FIGHTING FOR EVERY POINT IN THE QUEST FOR PREMIER LEAGUE SAFETY.**

Eight games of the campaign remained when Joe Royle's side produced their most comprehensive win of the campaign and with it a goal from Ian Olney that will long be remembered.

As survival went right down to the wire, tensions and nerves were climaxing, with Oldham sitting just two points off safety. Although safety was within reach, Latics were still glancing nervously over their shoulder, with basement-club Middlesbrough lying just one point behind.

Although Oldham found the net with regularity, they owned the poorest defensive record in the division, leaking 60 goals. Latics picked up the majority of their points on home soil, scoring 25 points from 16 home fixtures.

With five minutes played, Wimbledon forward John Fashanu demonstrated his aerial threat, only for his effort to come in the wrong goalmouth. Darren Barnard extended Oldham's lead, before Olney capped off a mesmerising first half display, netting a third before the interval.

Oldham's record transfer signing justified the star status that his transfer fee commanded, bagging a fourth goal that any player in the top flight would be proud of.

After a loose ball was cleared upfield, striker Andy Richie cleverly flicked the ball into the path of Olney. The London-born frontman displayed incredible poise, composure and flair, expertly lifting the ball over the retreating Hans Segers.

With Olney's goal cancelling out a spirited second-half fightback from Wimbledon and restoring a two-goal advantage, Neil Adams and Darren Beckford added gloss to the score line, capping off a resounding 6-2 victory for Latics.



# ANDY BARLOW

Homegrown Heroes // By Stuart Vose

**The 1990/91 Second Division-winning side is perhaps the most revered in Latics' history, and no-one made more appearances in that team than Andy Barlow.**

The stylish full-back is undoubtedly amongst the club's biggest home-grown names, making a shade over 300 appearances in blue and white.

Equally adept defensively or going forward, the native Oldhamer was a real all-rounder and, though he scored only five times for the club, his contributions led to many assists in Joe Royle's attack-minded sides.

His spell coincided with an incredible period of success, and Barlow lived the Royle era almost in its entirety.

The young boss had taken over in July 1982, and going into his third season his charges were 100/1 outsiders for the Second Division championship - favourites for relegation.

Barlow burst onto the scene and became a mainstay as the Boundary Park grass

gave way to the famous plastic pitch.

The 1986/87 season saw Latics knocked out in the new end-of-season promotion play-offs by Leeds United, when in any other recent season they would have gone up automatically.

Barlow will always be remembered as a key figure in the 'pinch me' season of 1989/90, when a small squad showed an iron will to complete a calendar of 65 competitive games. Barlow played in 63 of them, beaten only by Rick Holden, who featured in 64, and Earl Barrett who managed to play each and every one of the 65 fixtures.

Barlow played the full 90 minutes of the League Cup final defeat to Nottingham Forest and was prominent across the FA Cup and League as well as Latics came within inches of unprecedented success on multiple fronts.

Of course, any demons were exorcised the following season as Barlow and Latics won the Second Division

title on the final day of the season with that famous 3-2 victory over Sheffield Wednesday.

It was Barlow who was tripped by - of all people - John Sheridan, allowing Neil Redfearn to score that immortal goal from the spot.

Plastic and the Second Division gave way to grass and the top flight, with Barlow appearing across all of Latics' three seasons amongst the country's elite.

An 11-year spell would ultimately come to an end in July 1995 at the end of Latics' first season back in the second tier, as Barlow joined Blackpool. He would spend just under two years on the Fylde Coast, followed by a spell of a similar length at Rochdale.

He moved into coaching and is still helping to shape some of the country's up and coming coaches with the PFA.

One of the most instantly recognisable faces of some of Latics' most famous teams, Barlow remains Boundary Park loyalty to this day.

## IN HIS OWN WORDS

"I remember being invited into the first-team dressing room as a young player and that was something you had to earn. We had some great senior professionals who I'd seen from the age of 15 and I picked up so much from them.

"The lads pushed each other on the training ground. Willie Donachie was first team coach and still at the front in training, leading by example.

"It wasn't just me behind him on his shirt tails, there were six or seven others. Everyone was reminded on a daily basis that standards had to be higher.

"It was unacceptable to make a mistake. If a ball went to someone and didn't go into the back of the net, it was more than a nice rollicking, it would linger on. You were made to know the standards and the expectations on you as a player."

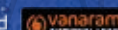
